DID YOU KNOW?

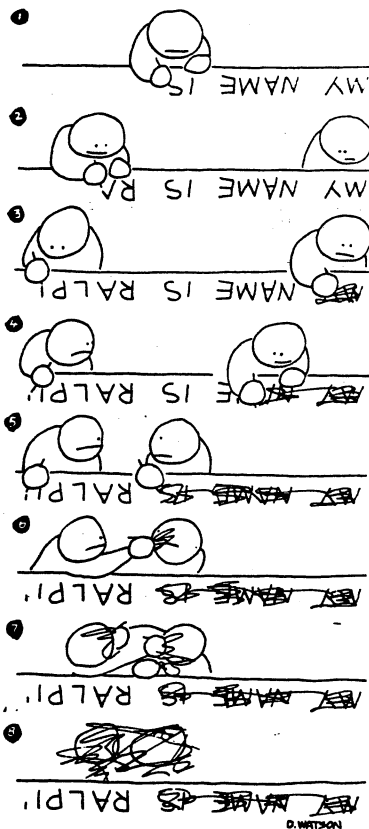
England is the oldest country on the British Isles.

This is a space filler. What are you?

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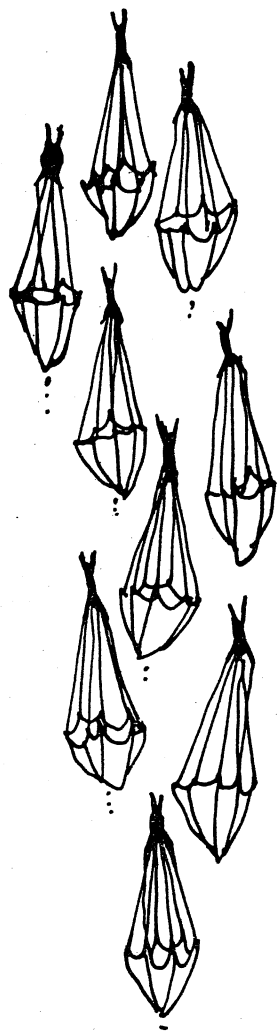
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
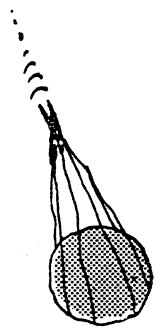
